

Dear Father

In Scripture, we hear about the “reign of God” or the “kingdom of God.” How does this notion of “kingdom” fit with modern Catholicism? Recently I heard a father tell his son: “I am the master of my domain!” The ten-year-old son was acting up and the father issued a statement clarifying that he, the father, was in charge, and the son was not! When we hear “reign of God” or “kingdom of God,” we are reminded again that God is “master of our domain.” We acknowledge that it is God who runs the show. Remember when Jesus first began to preach, he asked the people to repent because the kingdom of God was at hand (Matthew 4:17). This “kingdom” is the reign of justice and compassion that had been the core of the Jews' hopes for centuries preceding Jesus. This reign comes now in the person of Jesus. His preaching and work proclaim the birth of this new regime. It is a kingship where God, in the person of Jesus, now lives among the people (Luke 17:20–21). What virtues must we practice as members of the kingdom? These are outlined by Jesus in the beatitudes given in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:3–10). Jesus pronounces that those who are blessed are those who live such a life as Jesus chose for himself. Our rewards are also outlined here. God will comfort us, fill us with good things, and make us children of God. It is our task, then, to proclaim the kingdom of God by living like Jesus. One of the ways we do this is through the Sunday liturgy. It is there that we both hear how Jesus lived and prayed for “your kingdom come.” —Fr. Paul J. Coury, CSSR

Thanks to the approval of the Safer at Home variance requested by Garfield County we will be able to accommodate more people at each Mass.

Currently there is no obligation to attend Sunday Mass. If you are in a high risk group, have a cough, sick, or been in contact with a sick person, please do not attend. Risks exist and attendance is voluntary.

Garfield Public Health has issued these directives:

1. Masks (face coverings) shall be required by all guests, when at all possible. (Archdiocese states if under age 2-3 or for medical reasons exempt.)
2. Maintain at least 6 feet of distance between individuals or between groups of a single household.
3. Guests shall not be permitted to wait in the lobby area or in lines outside the door. No mingling time before, during, or after services.

Do not allow anyone to attend any event/activity in person if they are experiencing symptoms of any illness.

Seating

As more people begin attending Mass seating in the middle of the pews will need to be utilized. When you arrive please be seated in the middle of the pews so as others arrive they can sit at the ends and avoid having to climb over those already seated. If you need to be at the end of a pew then stand in the aisle to allow others access to the middle section. Please respect social distancing of 6 feet.

Distribution of Holy Communion

Everyone must approach the Eucharistic Minister staying 6 feet apart.

If you are **not** receiving communion, you must still approach, but cross your arms with your hands on your shoulders for a blessing.

You must receive the Eucharist in your open palm wearing no gloves. After you receive, step 6 feet in the appropriate direction from the minister, lower your face covering, consume, readjust face covering, and then return to your pew.

The Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will be in the baptismal font aisle. Only the people in the section by the chapel are to come forward to this minister to receive and return to pews via the aisle by the chapel.

Father will first distribute in the aisle by the piano. The cantor and musicians then the people in the entire section by the piano are to come forward and return to pews via the middle aisle.

Father will move to the middle aisle when the people by the chapel have finished receiving. The people in the **middle section** are to come forward via the **middle aisle** and return to pews via the **baptismal font aisle**.

The people in the **back section** are to come up the **middle aisle** to receive and return to pews via the **aisle by the piano**.

Exiting at the end of Mass

Dismissal will be by sections beginning with the last row in each section. Wait for the previous section to finish exiting. You will need to maintain 6 feet social distancing and exit directly with no visiting or mingling in the building.

1. The section by the **chapel** will exit **first** via the entrance doors.
2. Then the **back section** will exit after all by the chapel have exited. Follow the signs and arrows on the floor in the back of the church to the table and proceed past the elevator to the hall on the left and exit via the classroom door.
3. The **middle section** will exit **third** out the **middle aisle** following the signs out the classroom door.
4. Lastly the **piano section** will exit in a like manner via the classroom door.
